- ABMS recognizes the subspecialty of FPMRS
- June 2013 exam date for FPMRS is announced
- FPMRS Fellowships accredited by ACGME for the first time
- -AUGS transitions to a stand-alone organization
- AUGS celebrates its 40th annual scientific meeting with the AUGS/IUGA Scientific Meeting in Nashville, Tennessee

- Urogynecology and Reconstructive Pelvic Surgery URPS is changed to Female Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery (FPMRS)
- The AUGS Foundation is formed to support research regarding the causes, prevention, cure and treatment of Urogynecologic disorders
- The AUGS Foundation awards its first research grant
- The June Allyson Foundation merges with the AUGS Foundation to better support research to determine the causes and management of pelvic floor disorders

EDUCATION

Strategic Goal: Establish AUGS as the home for the highest quality scientific and clinical knowledge in FPMRS education.

RESEARCH

Strategic Goal: Promote basic and clinical research for the prevention and treatment of PFDs.

Hosted Deciding Our Future: Consensus Conference on Prolapse Outcomes and Best Practices for Mesh Complications

Meeting of leaders representing private and public stakeholders to identify current needs in the area of prolapse outcome measures and determine of a standardized group of outcome measures for future research and clinical ventures.

Launched AUGS/DUKE Urogynecology Clinical Research Educational Scientist Training (UrogynCREST)

Offers junior faculty the chance to increase their knowledge of data science and analytics as well as develop a project that can be the basis of future research grants through a combination of online course work in data sciences and one-on-one instruction to design and complete an innovative research project.

Jack Robertson Lifetime Achievement Award

AUGS' most prestigious award is presented periodically to an individual who has had a lifetime of outstanding achievements in the field of Female Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery and has served as a role model through service, basic or clinical research, and teaching.

Raymond A. Lee Endowment

The Raymond A. Lee Endowment is a named lectureship created by AUGS to honor one person annually who contributed to the development and surgical advancement of urogynecology and to further advance the knowledge and teaching of gynecologic surgery through ongoing AUGS educational programs.

The 2019 recipient is Peter Rosenblatt, MD. He presented his lecture, *The Future of Innovation in Female Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery,* **at the AUGS/IUGA Scientific Meeting.**



Robin Haff Research Award

This award is presented annually to an individual in recognition of outstanding and sustained contribution to female pelvic floor disorders research. The Robin Haff Research Award recognizes the important role that clinical research nurses and research coordinators play in the process. Without dedicated and committed staff, high quality research would not be possible.

The 2019 recipient is Colleen Mellen, APRN, for her tireless work in advancing this field for her fellow APRNs.

RESIDENT SCHOLAR AWARDS

This program funds third-year residents who have demonstrated an interest in Female Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery to attend the AUGS Annual Scientific Meeting and experience the current research initiatives going on within the field. Each scholar receives a \$1,000 award to cover travel, hotel accommodations, and meeting registration.






