Raymond A. Lee Lecture: A Primer in Ureteral Injury



Elizabeth Mueller, MD
Professor of Urology and OB/GYN Division and
Fellowship Director of FPMRS
Loyola University Chicago Stritch School of
Medicine

Dr. Mueller will cover the historical procedures in urology that demonstrate the principles of operating on the ureter. She will cover various treatment options and a modern approach to dealing with ureteral vaginal fistula treatment. Lastly, she will discuss in detail how to manage complications associated with ureteral injury.

Dr. Elizabeth R. Mueller MD, MSME, is a Professor of Urology and Obstetrics/Gynecology at Loyola University Chicago Stritch School of Medicine. She is also Division and Fellowship Director of Female Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery Program. She completed a BS in Mechanical Engineering at the University of Missouri-Rolla and a MS in Mechanical Engineering at Washington University in St. Louis. She practiced as an engineer and business manager with Procter and Gamble for six years before attending St. Louis University's School of Medicine. She completed her urology residency and FPMRS fellowship at Loyola University. She is board-certified in both.

Dr. Mueller is an NIH-funded researcher with an interest in minimally invasive (laparoscopic and vaginal) approaches to pelvic organ prolapse. She is a principle investigator and member of the NIDDK funded consortium on the Prevention of Lower Urinary Symptoms (PLUS) in women. Other areas of research interest include using 3-D ultrasound of the pelvic floor for pelvic floor disorders and management of surgical complications, understanding the urinary microbiome and its relationship to lower urinary tract symptoms. She is a gifted educator and has received numerous awards including Loyola University Stritch School of Medicine's "Attending of the Year" and the Society of Women in Urology Christina Manthos Mentoring Award given to men or women who have demonstrated extraordinary mentoring skills to female urologists. She is also the mother to incredible 15-year old twins, Jonathan and Mia Rose.

Surgical Tutorial - Pubo-vaginal Slings Columbus Hall KL

Over the past decade, the synthetic mid-urethral sling (MUS) overwhelmingly emerged as the primary surgical treatment option for stress urinary incontinence (SUI), arguably relegating the pubovaginal sling (PVS) to second-line therapy. Contemporary application of PVS is typically reserved for concomitant use in reconstructive procedures in the presence of a fistula, diverticula, or urethral reconstruction; or, in the setting of a mesh failure or severe intrinsic sphincter deficiency. However, a plethora of well publicized MUS issues has promoted a resurgence of the PVS as a primary surgical treatment option for SUI in the index patient. This clinical seminar will discuss the indications for PVS, discuss the evidence base for use of PVS, allow the participant to understand the steps and nuances of the surgical procedure, as well as recognize complications of PVS and appropriate management.

Defecation is a coordinated process that involves generation of sufficient propulsive forces in the abdomen and rectum combined with relaxation of the puborectalis and external anal sphincter muscles. Defecation disorders are functional or structural anorectal processes that disrupt this coordinated effort and result in chronic or recurring difficulty in evacuating stool from the rectum. They are common and can affect up to 50 percent of patients with chronic constipation. Symptoms alone are often insufficient to distinguish patients with defecation disorders from those with other types of constipation. The definitive diagnosis is usually made using a combination of a clinical history of chronic constipation and the abnormal diagnostic test results (balloon expulsion, defecography, electromyelography, anal rectal manometry). This multidisciplinary panel will discuss the clinical symptoms of defecatory disorders, the physical examination findings and diagnostic tests employed to make the diagnosis, and the various therapeutic options available to treat the condition.



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






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
